Rebecca Washington is the most recent recipient of the Doc Wiseman Continuing Education Fund award.

"I'm so grateful for the help this fund provided!" Rebecca, a Clinician at Farrell, traveled to Puerto Rico and Vieques for a 2-week study abroad trip with the University of Connecticut School of Social Work. This program is a long-standing collaboration between UConn and the University of Puerto Rico School of Social Work, which immerses students in the culture of Puerto Rico and its sister island, Vieques.

Every day was jam packed with educational and cultural experiences, which included: meeting with community leaders; visiting the home and studio of renowned artist, Samuel Lind; trying local cuisine; and learning about the history and practices of social work on the island.

"The trip was absolutely amazing! This was one of those life changing experiences," said Rebecca. She learned concepts that she wasn't familiar with in the U.S. and gained insight on how social work differs in Puerto Rico.

Rebecca found she was able to take her experience from working at Gilead and incorporate what she learned on the trip. She is currently working on

SOBER SOFTBALL: A HOME RUN

This year, one of our staff members at the Farrell Treatment Center approached the Leadership Team with the idea of forming a Farrell/Gilead softball team for Middletown's Sober Softball League. Everyone loved the idea!

The league is made up of men and woman in the community who are in recovery and staying clean and sober. With the help of Gilead's sponsorship, Farrell formed a team made up of former clients who have been successful in continuous long-term sobriety and who still stay connected. Gilead collaborated with the team to create jerseys displaying each players' name and the team name: The Farrell Warriors. These were provided at zero cost to the players who are in recovery - the only team in the league to do this! This first season was a great success and we were able to be competitive in a league of teams that have been playing together for vears!

Our team played with great enthusiasm, sportsmanship, and fun. The other teams were welcoming and routinely commented on the spirit, camaraderie, morale, and positive vibe of the Farrell Warriors. More importantly, each player on the team was able to maintain their sobriety and were provided a great outlet for

having fun every Sunday morning. After each game, the players would huddle up placing their hands on top of each other's in the middle of the circle. It was customary after each game for the coach to then say, "there's nowhere I'd rather be on a Sunday morning then right here with you guys." On three, they would all chant: "Warriors". With the loads of encouragement, support, togetherness, and positivity that the team showed, the season was a win!

It was such a smash hit that the Farrell team will be returning this fall and for many years to come!

MENTAL HEALTH RESOURCE CENTER OPEN HOUSE

A dream came to life on a hot summer afternoon as the Mental Health Resource Center staff demonstrated what happens when someone calls, emails, or stops by.

On Wednesday, July 12th the parking lot of the MHRC became a festive fairground for an interactive service navigation simulation. Attendees received a scenario and walked through the activity as Gilead's Service Navigators guided them to the resources they need. Each navigator represented a different service at the Resource Center: Service Navigation, Physical Needs, Mental Health, Community Outreach, and Emotional Self-Care. By the time they finished the exercise, each guest had met with each station and walked away with knowledge on how the MHRC can help them or someone in their lives.

Seeing the MHRC in action has been years in the making. The resource center is a result of a shared vision between board members Fran Ludwig and Russ and Leslie Hassmann, who understand the difficulties of finding support through this complex system. Now, anyone can find support and comfort knowing that the MHRC is just one call away!

Now that so many staff, clients, and community members understand service navigation, the MHRC has a crew of ambassadors who can share this amazing resource with friends, family, and anyone who could use the support.
